

A mis ojos, la relación entre la arqueología y los petroglifos es incomprendible, o más bien accidental. Un mundo que también desapareció. Esa información la conozco, la manejo, pero no me dice nada acerca de aquellos petroglifos en particular.

Quienes cifraron esos mensajes jamás imaginaron que algún día existiríamos nosotros. Eso me confiere una vaga sensación de superioridad, como si me asomara por el ojo de una cerradura a un cuarto prohibido. Ellos no nos ven, pero nosotros los vemos. Pero ¿los vemos nosotros? Ahí están los dibujos tallados en la piedra, tratando de decir algo que no entendemos. No: tal vez nosotros tampoco los vemos, y los imaginamos de la misma manera confusa, arbitraria y limitada en que acaso los hicieron ellos.

Ciudad y Ciencias Sociales en el Reino Unido*

Resumen : Este ensayo pretende mostrar las causas del desplazamiento forzado y las características del modo de vida de la población que se desplaza, haciendo énfasis en los afroamericanos de la costa pacífica y los indígenas andinos. El referente geográfico son los Departamentos del Cauca y del Valle del Cauca, y principalmente las ciudades de Cali y Popayán, las cuales permiten poner en evidencia la categoría de los nuevos colonizadores urbanos como un mecanismo explicativo de la reconfiguración socio cultural y espacial de esta zona.

Abstract : A survey was made of British titles on the theme of the City in Latin America, produced since 1985: books published in the United Kingdom, periodical articles in journals published in the United Kingdom, and theses completed in UK Universities. The sources used were British and foreign bibliographies and indexes in printed form and on CD-ROM, and a wide range of British and foreign online databases. The searches produced 135 books, 571 periodical articles and 254 theses. The search strategies are described. The bibliography is analysed for its coverage of the Latin American City: by country, subject and historical period.

El objetivo de este estudio es analizar y describir las líneas de investigación en el área de las ciencias sociales acerca de la ciudad que han sido objeto de interés en los libros y artículos de revista publicados en el Reino Unido, y en las tesis leídas en universidades británicas, desde el año 1985 en adelante.

METODOLOGIA

Nos hemos limitado, por razones de tiempo, a los países hispanos de América Latina y del Caribe, y a Brasil.

Hemos rechazado los numerosos capítulos publicados en compilaciones y obras colectivas y ponencias presentadas a congresos. Nos hemos ceñido estrictamente al estudio de las grandes ciudades del período moderno, omitiendo así investigaciones sobre la ciudad precolombina y sobre las ciudades pequeñas (denominadas 'towns' en inglés). Sin embargo, hemos incluido en nuestra estrategia de búsqueda el término 'town', ya que los encabezamientos de temas tales como 'Cities and towns' y 'Town and city planning' se aplican tanto a las ciudades como a los 'towns'. De otra parte, hemos empleado el

pleno rango en términos geográficos relacionados con el continente y sus regiones ('Latin America', 'South America', 'Central America', 'Caribbean' 'West Indies', y el adjetivo 'American'), así como también a los varios países, en combinación con descriptores de temas relevantes ('city', 'cities', 'megacity', 'megacities', 'metropolis', 'urban', 'urbanization', 'urbanisation' (ver abajo), 'town and city planning' (ver arriba), 'urban sociology', 'favela(s)', 'shanty-town(s)', 'squatter settlements' y 'street children').

Las búsquedas bibliográficas se han realizado utilizando las fuentes siguientes: en formatos impresos, en CD-ROMs y en línea.

Para libros y artículos de revista, se ha empleado como doble fuente de información la bibliografía semi-anual de publicaciones en lengua inglesa compilada por la biblioteca de Canning House en Londres – el Boletín británico de publicaciones sobre América Latina, el Caribe, Portugal y España (*British bulletin of publications on Latin America, the Caribbean, Portugal and Spain*). Ésta incluye, ordenadas por país, monografías (libros, informes, documentos de trabajo, panfletos, etcétera), con resúmenes críticos, y una selección de artículos, sin resúmenes.

Para libros, los dos millones de entradas bibliográficas creadas en CD-ROM para la bibliografía nacional británica (*British national bibliography*), desde 1950, y en línea (por medio de la base de datos Eureka, del Research Libraries Group) desde 1985 en adelante. El software ofrece más de 25 campos de búsqueda y permite combinar términos y refinar los resultados añadiendo otros términos; puede también limitar los resultados por país de publicación. Una búsqueda de 'América Latina' o 'latinoamerican*' (uso del *wildcard* que busca a la vez 'latinoamericano', 'latinoamericana', 'latinoamericanos' y 'latinoamericanas'), junto con 'ciudad', produjo 23 registros; los mismos términos geográficos utilizando 'ciudades' dió un resultado de 16; con 'town' o 'towns', 17; con 'urban*', 35; y con 'urbanización', 15.

La combinación 'América Latina' o 'latinoamericano' con 'ciudad' o 'ciudades' dio un total de 1.820 registros. Combinando 'América Latina' o 'latinoamericano' con 'ciudad' o 'ciudades' o 'town' o 'towns' o 'urbano', produjo un total de 6.000 registros. Hay que tener en cuenta, como detallaremos más adelante, que no todos los registros refieren a publicaciones británicas.

Una segunda fuente bibliográfica para artículos de revista es el índice británico en humanidades (*British humanities index*), lo cual recoge referencias de unos 400 periódicos editados en el Reino Unido, en las siguientes materias: artes, música, filosofía, religión, literatura, economía, política, historia, sociedad y (para artículos no especializados) ciencia y tecnología. Su publicación es trimestral, con cumulaciones anuales. Tampoco lleva resúmenes, pero el índice está organizado según encabezamientos de materia ayudando normalmente a deducir de qué trata el artículo. Para los que utilizan la versión impresa (1950–) de este recurso, afortunadamente, y a diferencia de la bibliografía nacional británica, el índice siempre remite desde cualquier tema al nombre del país en cuestión, evitando que se tenga que buscar bajo los nombres de ciudades o cada uno de los términos relacionados a la ciudad. La versión en CD-ROM comprende unos 240 000 registros que se remontan al año 1985. La versión en línea (desde 1962 hasta la fecha), actualizada con la adición de 1 500 registros por mes, incluye más de 688 000 registros.

Para trabajos de tesis utilizamos el índice nacional de tesis (*Index to theses of the British Isles*), impreso y en línea. Este índice recoge las tesis presentadas en las universidades de la Gran Bretaña e Irlanda entre 1970 y 2003. Los

registros están clasificados por más de 300 subdivisiones dentro de 11 áreas de materias principales. El sistema no permite limitar la búsqueda al período desde 1985. La versión impresa ha dejado de incluir un índice de materias desde 1998. Se ha ido buscando por los descriptores amplios como 'ciudad', 'ciudades', 'urbano', y por los nombres individuales de países y de media docena de las ciudades más importantes en cada país, más los términos regionales 'América Latina', 'latinoamericano' y 'Andes'. En este caso hemos utilizado la lista de términos de búsqueda sugeridos por los coordinadores de este proyecto de investigación, a los cuales añadimos varios otros, como 'autoconstrucción', 'socio-espacial', 'polución', 'gestión de residuos', 'favela', etcétera. Un búsqueda de 'América Latina' o 'latinoamerican*' (uso del *wildcard*) y 'ciudad', o 'ciudades', o 'town*', o 'urban*', produjo 144 registros. Tesis británicas están también incluidas en Dissertation Abstracts Online.

Finalmente, pero no menos importante, en la búsqueda de libros y artículos de revista, hemos revisado un gran número de bases de datos e índices especializados, tanto británicos como internacionales, los cuales dan acceso a la literatura global sobre ciencias sociales y humanidades. Algunas bases de datos recogen varios índices y permiten buscar en las bases de datos simultáneamente – por ejemplo, el Arts and Humanities Citation Index, el Social Science Citation Index, el Science Citation Index y el International Bibliography of the Social Sciences, todos accesibles a través del servicio Web of Knowledge suministrado por en Institute of Scientific Information, ISI. Algunas bases de datos también ofrecen al usuario el texto completo de los artículos, además de la facilidad de búsqueda. Las bases de datos que utilizamos adicionalmente en nuestras búsquedas bibliográficas son: Anthropological Literature, America: History and Life, Arts and Humanities Citation Index, Avery Index to Architectural Periodicals, Bibliography of the History of Art, British Library Map Catalogue, British Library Public Catalogue, Book History Online, Boston Spa Serials, Business Source Premier, Citation Indexes, COPAC [catálogo colectivo en línea de bibliotecas universitarias británicas, más la British Library], Dictionary of National Biography, Ergonomics Abstracts, ERIC, FRANCIS, Historical Abstracts, Handbook of Latin American Studies, Hispanic American Periodicals Index, Index Translationum, Ingenta, Inside Information Plus, International Bibliography of the Social Sciences, International Encyclopedia of the Social & Behavioral Sciences, JSTOR: Scholarly Journals Online [archivo de 117 revistas en texto completo], Medline/PubMed, MLA Directory of Periodicals, MLA International Bibliography, Periodicals Contents Index Full Text, Philosophers Index, Proquest Newspapers, PsycINFO: Psychological Abstracts, RLIN Bibliographic database (EUREKA), Routledge Encyclopedia of Philosophy, Science Citation Index, Social Science Citation Index, Uncover, Zetoc: British Library Electronic Table of Contents.

Obviamente, sería interesante y útil explorar otras bases de datos especializadas para ver si contienen referencias adicionales.

ANALISIS

El alcance de la investigación sobre la ciudad es tan amplio que – en el caso de las fuentes impresas – nos hemos limitado normalmente a buscar términos de nombres geográficos, seleccionando los documentos relacionados a nuestro tema. Aunque parezca más laborioso que buscar cada término especializado referente a la ciudad, nuestro método (menos científico, ciertamente) nos pareció más inclusivo y menos propenso a malos aciertos. En el caso de

los libros y artículos de revista que hemos localizado, ha habido que ir mirando la información temática expresada por los títulos, uno por uno (no hemos examinado físicamente los documentos), para ver si cumplían los requisitos que se buscaban. De otra parte, las facilidades de búsqueda superiores por medio de CD-ROM y de bases de datos en línea, junto con los resúmenes de documentos que ellos proveen, han revolucionado la compilación de bibliografías tales como las de este estudio.

Puesto que no hemos examinado físicamente los documentos recuperados, es posible que en todas las búsquedas que hayamos realizado, hayamos perdido por inadvertencia algún otro artículo si el título no revelaba su conexión con la ciudad. En todos los casos nos encontramos enfrentados con el problema de ¿qué es una publicación británica? Obviamente, un libro editado por una editorial británica o un artículo en una revista británica. El segundo problema que nos hemos planteado reside en la nacionalidad de los autores. Las publicaciones británicas son firmadas por autores británicos, sí, pero también por autores estadounidenses, europeos y latinoamericanos. Al mismo tiempo, muchos autores británicos eligen exponer sus estudios en publicaciones estadounidenses, europeas y latinoamericanas.

Un problema con el uso de la lengua inglesa está relacionada con la ortografía: la palabra 'urbanización' se escribe normalmente con 's' en el inglés británico ('urbanisation'), pero en el inglés norteamericano siempre se escribe con 'z' ('urbanization'). Hay que recordar que otras palabras (como labour/labor) se escriben de forma diferente en las dos variedades del inglés. Por esta razón hace falta combinar (por ejemplo) el nombre de un país con el término escrito de las dos maneras para estar seguro de obtener todas las referencias relevantes. En Historical abstracts, utilizando descriptores, una búsqueda de 'América Latina' con 'urbanización' (con 'z') produjo 124 títulos, mientras que la misma búsqueda con 'urbanisation' (con 's') produjo sólo un título; una búsqueda utilizando encabezamientos de temas produjo 55 títulos con 'z', mientras que la misma búsqueda con 's' ¡no produjo ni una sola referencia! La misma búsqueda en la bibliografía nacional británica en CD-ROM (1950-1995) produjo 15 títulos con 'z' y 17 con 's'. Una búsqueda con 'América Latina' o 'latinoamericano/a/os/as', con 'ciudad' o 'ciudades' o 'town' (ciudad pequeña) o 'urbano/a/os/as', produjo los siguientes resultados en una muestra de diez índices y bases de datos: Academic Search Primer (984), America: History and Life (48), Citation Indexes (611), Historical Abstracts (170), HAPI (124), Ingenta/Uncover (234), Index to theses (144), IBSS (477), PCI (149), PsycINFO (134), Zetoc (303) – dando un total de 3.378 referencias (con ciertas duplicaciones).

A continuación vamos a presentar un análisis de la bibliografía recuperada en su totalidad, sin hacer caso de la nacionalidad de los autores. En las tablas se reflejan el número de documentos en los que cada país o materia ha sido tratado.

Se han contabilizado 135 libros, 571 artículos de revista y 254 tesis sobre la ciudad.

En su mayoría, la bibliografía pertenece al ámbito contemporáneo de la ciudad (88,9 por ciento de libros, 90,9 por ciento de artículos, 89,4 por ciento de tesis). Los temas generales (incluyendo trabajos sobre 3 o más ciudades indicadas) han despertado el interés de 44 títulos monográficos, y estudios sobre una o dos ciudades, 5 títulos. Los temas generales están presentes en 45 artículos, y estudios sobre una o dos ciudades, en 35 artículos. Como se puede ver en las tablas, los temas dominantes son: economía, empleo, medio

ambiente, niños de la calle (más bien en revistas), planificación, política, vivienda y sociedad. La investigación sobre salud publicada en libros atrae un bajo número de autores en comparación con las revistas y las tesis.

En cuanto a los países estudiados, encontramos, sin sorpresa, que sobresale en primer lugar los estudios sobre el Brasil, con una respuesta muy similar en cuanto a libros y artículos (20 y 25 por ciento respectivamente), por contraste con las tesis (un asombroso 49 por ciento). Sin embargo, México ocupa el primer lugar en cuanto a artículos (27 por ciento), y el segundo lugar en cuanto a libros (15 por ciento) y tesis (19 por ciento).

Hemos localizado artículos de revista en un total de 95 revistas británicas. Las que aportan el mayor número de artículos son las siguientes:

Las dos revistas americanistas británicas, el *Journal of Latin American Studies* y el *Bulletin of Latin American Research*, que representan 80 artículos, o sea una séptima parte de los resultados. Mencionaremos brevemente cuáles son los títulos que aportan más de 10 referencias de entre las 19 revistas urbanísticas identificadas por nuestra encuesta: *Environment and Urbanization* (67), *Habitat International* (28), *Third World Planning Review* (27), *International Journal of Urban and Regional Research* y *Cities* (ambas con 20 referencias). Hemos clasificado el resto de las revistas en tres bloques, ninguno de los títulos aportando más de quince artículos: 31 revistas dedicadas a temas del desarrollo, 16 especializadas en cuestiones de la salud, y 27 revistas misceláneas.

Hemos contado 254 tesis sobre la ciudad. El país más estudiado es Brasil (128 de las 254 tesis, representando un asombroso 49 por ciento). Se quedan atrás México con 18,8 por ciento, Chile (8,5 por ciento) y Colombia (5 por ciento). Los doce países restantes alcanzan entre 0,4 y 3,5 por ciento. Argentina sólo cuenta con 2,7 por ciento de las tesis, un porcentaje relativamente bajo que hemos notado anteriormente en otras encuestas bibliográficas de esta índole.

En su mayoría las tesis tratan sobre temas contemporáneos. La preocupación principal entre los estudiantes es en relación a salud (que representa – número igualmente asombroso – 19,2 por ciento de los títulos). Vivienda y condiciones sociales representan cada uno casi 12 por ciento de tesis, planificación urbana 10,4, empleo 5,0 y administración local 4,6, siendo los menos numerosos los relativos a: conservación de edificios, cultura, desastres/terremotos, economía, educación, industria, medio ambiente, migración, niños de la calle, política, recursos naturales, religión, servicios públicos y transporte – disciplinas que representan entre el 0,4 y 4,2 por ciento.

Es notable la preponderancia de los términos 'con bajos ingresos' ('low-income', 10 títulos), 'de bajo costo' ('low-cost', 4), 'pobre' y 'pobreza' (10), 'villa miseria', 'favela', 'barrio', 'colonia popular' y otros términos indicando vivienda pobre (30). Adicionalmente, muchos de los títulos de las tesis restantes revelan o implican que los autores han enfocado los sectores más desvalidos de la sociedad urbana.

Las dos quintas partes (41 por ciento) de las tesis fueron presentadas en los varios colegios de la Universidad de Londres, una dominación geográfica que sugiere la atracción para los estudiantes de los grandes nombres de la disciplina como Alan Gilbert ('decano' de los estudios geográficos latinoamericanistas en el Reino Unido, miembro del departamento de geografía en University College London), el renombre de la London School of Economics and Political Science con su variedad de facultades dedicadas a las ciencias sociales, y el aliciente de conocidas escuelas o institutos especializados en temas como la salud (Escuela londinense de ciencias de la higiene y medicina

tropical, Instituto de psiquiatría). Por contraste, un total de sólo 59 tesis acerca de la ciudad fueron leídas en los centros de estudios latinoamericanos tradicionales ubicados fuera de la capital (Oxford, Cambridge, Liverpool, Glasgow y Essex). En el norte de Inglaterra, la Universidad de Leeds (que posee una prestigiosa Escuela de Geografía) y la remota Universidad de Newcastle-upon-Tyne (con una escuela de arquitectura y planificación urbana que afortunadamente reconoce el continente de América Latina), los siguen honrosamente con 9 y 5 tesis respectivamente. Entre 1986 y 1998 las Universidades de Sheffield y de Sussex produjeron cada una cinco tesis y desde 1995 estudiantes del Open University y de Oxford Brookes University han escrito 7 y 6 tesis respectivamente sobre el tema de la ciudad latinoamericana.

* * *

Vamos ahora a ir más alla de las estadísticas generales y a examinar el aporte de académicos británicos a los estudios de la ciudad latinoamericana.

En 1986 el anteriormente mencionado geógrafo Alan Gilbert, en un artículo perspicaz¹, había lamentado la escasez de investigaciones, por parte de geógrafos radicados en universidades británicas, sobre el tercer mundo. (No todos los investigadores sobre 'la ciudad' son geógrafos, pero creemos que el caso es ilustrativo.) La mayoría de geógrafos, revela Gilbert, se ocupan casi exclusivamente (cuando no del propio Reino Unido) de la Europa del Oeste y de los Estados Unidos. Cuando escribía Gilbert había 23 geógrafos latinoamericanistas, según la guía nacional de investigaciones sobre América Latina en Reino Unido editada por el Instituto de estudios latinoamericanos de Londres².

En el espacio de diecisiete años, podemos observar, según la última edición de la guía³, un aumento grato de más de cien por cien en el número de geógrafos (51, sin contar 6 que se ocupan del Caribe no-hispánico). Los registros aportan información acerca de la especialidad temática y zonal de cada investigador. Sólo 25 geógrafos latinoamericanistas, según las palabras claves de área de investigación, nos dejan indicios de su interés en lo urbano – utilizando términos como urbanización, política urbana, planificación urbana, desarrollo (o crecimiento) urbano, diseño urbano, mercados urbanos de finca raíz, suministro urbano de agua, sector informal urbano, pobreza urbana, medio ambiente urbano, y violencia urbana. A esta lista podemos añadir los nombres de otros 26 investigadores que estudian 'la ciudad', del punto de vista político, económico o sociológico y quienes se autoclasifican en aquellas áreas. En nuestra opinión, entonces, existirían aproximadamente 50 académicos británicos dedicados a aspectos múltiples de 'la ciudad' en América Latina. Pero, como en el caso de la búsqueda metodológica en bibliografías, índices y bases de datos, no se encuentran bajo una sola clasificación conveniente, y hace falta pasar los nombres por el tamiz para quedarse con los verdaderos especialistas.

En 1986 Gilbert nota una preponderancia de libros 'cuyo ámbito ambicioso y de gran amplitud disciplinaria proclamaban su universalidad' ['whose ambitious and all embracing scope proclaim their universality']. Diecisiete años más tarde podemos observar también que un alto porcentaje de los libros (44 de 135 títulos) tratan sobre América Latina en general.

Escribe Gilbert que pocos estudios habían sobre género o el sector informal – aparte de lo relacionado con la vivienda para familias con bajos ingresos ('low-income housing'). Los temas relativos a la ciudad que generaban más

estudios hace 17 años fueron: industrialización, concentración y desconcentración urbanas, planificación urbana y vivienda. En efecto, durante el período siguiente y objeto de nuestro análisis, libros sobre planificación y urbanización editados en el Reino Unido representan 15 por ciento de todos los libros publicados, vivienda 12,8 por ciento, e industrialización 1,4 por ciento.

Gilbert sugirió más investigación sobre 'lo que pasa dentro de la ciudad' – es decir, el acceso a servicios como educación, salud, transporte e infraestructura (como agua y electricidad). De los trabajos aparecidos dentro de estos temas la mayoría trataba la vivienda y mucho derivaba – y sigue derivando – de las investigaciones sistemáticas realizadas sobre este aspecto de la ciudad en el departamento de geografía de University College London. Gilbert termina su artículo haciendo hincapié en tres asuntos en que hacía falta más labor investigativa: el sector productivo informal, el rol político de las comunidades y movimientos sociales, y las necesidades energéticas de áreas urbanas.

Analizando estos mismos temas desde el punto de vista de los resultados de nuestras búsquedas, revela que libros sobre empleo (incluyendo el sector informal urbano) editados en el Reino Unido representan el 7,8 por ciento del total, salud 1,4 por ciento, y política comunitaria y servicios públicos 1 por ciento cada uno. En cuanto a los temas de transporte y energía, hay una ausencia total de títulos por autores británicos durante el período analizado.

También lamenta Gilbert que sólo cinco tesis en el área de la geografía humana sobre temas latinoamericanos fueran leídas por estudiantes británicos en la década de los ochenta (es decir, entre 1980 y 1985). Siguiendo su análisis, estimamos que, entre 1986 y 1989, cuatro estudiantes británicos presentaron tesis sobre temas humanísticos de la ciudad. La situación ha cambiado en la presente década y media, y hemos encontrado unos 20 tesis por estudiantes británicos en el mismo ramo de estudios.

* * *

Vamos a examinar a continuación el tratamiento de países y materias en la bibliografía británica 'autéctona' sobre la ciudad.

Unos 78 de los 135 libros son el producto intelectual de autores académicos británicos. Hay un alto porcentaje de títulos (35,3 por ciento) sobre la América Latina en general, seguido de Brasil (17), México (12,8), Perú (6), y Argentina, Venezuela y Colombia (4,9 cada uno). Los países minoritarios representan entre 1 y 3 por ciento.

¿Cómo explicar estas tendencias? Como nota Gilbert, hubo y hay una propensión de parte de los académicos británicos a producir textos comprensivos sobre urbanización latinoamericana. Como es de suponer, los tres países grandes (Argentina, Brasil y México) comparten una tercera parte de las referencias.

Es la planificación y urbanización de ciudad que compone el porcentaje mayor de los libros (15,5 por ciento), seguida de las categorías de la vivienda y la arquitectura (ambas con 13,3 por ciento), condiciones sociales (10,4 por ciento), y el medio ambiente y niños de la calle (ambas con 9,6 por ciento). El empleo compartía el porcentaje mayor de títulos, junto con la ciudad en general, en los años ochenta y comienzos de los noventa (ambos con 15 por ciento), pero en los últimos años ha perdido terreno (8,1 por ciento de todos los libros desde 1985 hasta la fecha). Las disciplinas minoritarias son: administración local, bienestar social, cultura, derechos humanos, desastres/terremotos, economía, industria, migración, política,

religión, salud, servicios públicos y aspectos lingüísticos, entre el 0,7 y 5,2 por ciento.

Volviendo a las revistas, hemos encontrado al menos 40 autores de los 571 artículos que ocupan o ocupaban puestos académicos en universidades del Reino Unido.

Luego de un examen de los artículos restantes, estimamos que hasta 80 autores en total son británicos. No es de sorprender que los tres países mayoritarios vuelvan a ser Brasil y México con un total de 46,7 por ciento de los artículos publicados. Sobresale México con 27 por ciento de los artículos. Brasil cuenta 19,7 por ciento de los artículos, América Latina en general 12,3 por ciento, Colombia 9,3 por ciento, Perú 5,4 por ciento y Argentina 2,9 por ciento, los demás países contando entre 0,5 y 2,5 por ciento de las referencias.

La investigación en revistas está especialmente interesada en estudios de vivienda y arquitectura (9,1 por ciento de todos los artículos), planificación urbana y sociedad (ambas 5,6 por ciento), niños de la calle (1,6 por ciento), y medio ambiente (1,4 por ciento). Otros temas menos estudiados son: administración local, alimentos, clima, conservación de edificios, cuestiones del terreno, cultura, desastres/terremotos, economía, educación, empleo, investigación, migración, política, población, recursos naturales, salud y servicios públicos (incluyendo suministración de agua y transporte).

De las 60 tesis 'británicas' sobre la ciudad leídas entre 1986 y 2003, los países de estudio son: México (12 títulos), Brasil (10), Chile (9), Colombia (6), Perú (5), Cuba y República Dominicana (ambos 3), Argentina y Bolivia (ambos 2), y (con 1 título cada uno), América Latina en general, el Caribe, Costa Rica, Ecuador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Uruguay y Venezuela. Los temas estudiados son: vivienda y cuestiones del terreno (16 títulos), sociedad y comunidad (13), política (9), mujer (9), cultura (3), salud (3), empleo, educación y religión (con 2 títulos), y economía (con un título).

Es de destacar que de las 254 tesis recopiladas, los autores de unas 200 llevan nombres latinoamericanos o no-británicos. Esta generalización no significa que los estudiantes con nombres latinoamericanos o europeos no sean británicos, pero sabemos que hay un alto número de estudiantes latinoamericanos inscritos en universidades británicas, y que nuestra proporción estimada de estudiantes extranjeros no sería demasiado exagerada. En nuestra experiencia, los estudiantes brasileños (y mexicanos y argentinos) son 'golondrinas académicas', a corto plazo, gozando de fondos propios o becas institucionales, mientras que suponemos, sin evidencia cierta, que los estudiantes que han presentado un número relativamente alto de tesis sobre Chile, Perú, Colombia, Bolivia o Venezuela, y que llevan apellidos hispanos, es más probable que estén radicado en el Reino Unido, y aventuramos la teoría de que son refugiados o representan la segunda generación de inmigrantes en nuestro país.

* * *

Reconociendo que nuestra recopilación de publicaciones y tesis británicas es el producto de un conjunto multinacional de académicos, periodistas, estudiantes y aficionados del tema, ¿qué parte tienen los académicos británicos?

En ciertas disciplinas, los autores británicos de libros (notablemente) representan la mayoría de los que estudian cuestiones urbanas: en los campos de bienestar social, niños de la calle, empleo, salud y vivienda. En una segunda fila de disciplinas, sus trabajos monográficos representan la mitad o una tercera parte de los estudios – planificación urbana, medio ambiente y

temas políticos y económicos de la ciudad. Es en el crisol multidisciplinario de las publicaciones periódicas, mucho más abierto a la comunidad internacional de autores, que los investigadores comparten, de modo no menos significativo, temas urbanísticos generales, administración local, servicios públicos y cuestiones de terreno urbano y conservación.
